

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES**

FINANCE

Finance Activities

The P-Card total for the month of June was \$242,798.99 which was greater than May by \$83,215.23. The Finance Department began work on the FY2016 Budget Work Program. All employees, agency revenue and agency expenditures were reviewed and tied to new Statewide Program codes which are now a part of the financial system. This will give state officials the ability to review all revenues and expenses at the state level for specifically identified programs that span multiple agencies. Representatives from the State Auditor's Office completed their field work for the FY2013-FY2014 audit. An exit conference is expected in early July.

Expenses

During the month of June, Finance processed 212 vouchers to vendors totaling \$784,835.82 which was \$958,206.98 less than the month of May. Extraordinary expenditures are \$120,836.10 to PSC Environmental for Unwanted Pesticide Disposal and \$114,373 to Rush Trucking for the purchase of a Class 8 Truck Tractor for the Forestry Division.

Revenue

Revenue for the month of June totaled \$1,567,551 which is 14.86 % below the budgeted amount of \$1,841,156. Revenue for FY2015 totaled \$15,316,128 which is 10% below the fiscal year estimate. Annual revenue was above estimates for CPS and Wildlife Services and below estimates for Forestry. Remaining divisions were at or near fiscal year estimates.

Budget

The FY2016 Agency Budget Work Program was submitted and approved by OMES in the amount of \$43,500,359. An agency summary is attached for review – see page A-8.

HUMAN RESOURCES

Personnel, Time/Leave, Benefits and Training Sections

Personnel transactions processed during the month of June included: three classified new hires (Forestry=2 & Ag Laboratory), one promotion (Animal Industry), one completion of probation (Animal Industry), one Classified to Unclassified transition (CPS), one voluntary resignation (Ag Laboratory), and two retirements (CPS).

Training

The HR Office is working with the HCM Department to create accessibility to the Skillsoft training modules for all ODAFF employees. The Executive Office has submitted a request to HCM to create and provide "Sexual Harassment" training which will be mandatory for all agency employees. Skillsoft accessibility will allow employees to take this and other trainings via the web. A license must be obtained through HCM for each employee. Secretary Reese and Directors will have a higher level of accessibility. Licensing request has been submitted to HCM.

INVESTIGATIVE SERVICES

Investigative Services continues to respond to calls for assistance from farmers and ranchers regarding agriculture related crimes. Other state and local law enforcement agencies also call for Investigative Services' assistance in combating crimes against agriculture producers. Cattle Theft investigations led those initiated during this reporting period with forty-eight (48) head of cattle reported stolen during this reporting period.

During June, Special Agents opened eight (8) new investigations with four (4) concerning cattle theft, two (2) cases of farm equipment theft, one (1) case opened for information only and one (1) case where we searched for stranded cattle in flooded areas. Special Agents closed nine (9) investigations with three (3) cases submitted to the District Attorney for prosecution with 40 counts. There were two (2) investigations where it was determined that no crime occurred and two (2) cases where no prosecution was required.

Some of the significant cases investigated during the current reporting period are described below.

On July 17th, Chief Agent Flowers was asked to assist Canadian County Sheriff's Deputies with tracking a farm tractor that had been found stashed in a wooded area in northern Canadian County. The large farm tractor was stolen from where it was parked in a field near a local farmer. During the night, deputies placed a GPS tracking device on the stolen tractor to see if the suspects might return to retrieve the hidden tractor. The next day, Chief Agent Flowers and deputies were stationed near the tractor and, about 3 p.m., the tractor began to move. The tractor was followed on country roads in Canadian County until the suspect spotted sheriff's vehicles following him. The suspect plowed through several fences with the tractor in an attempt to get away. The suspect stopped the tractor in a field close to a residential neighborhood and tried to run away and hide. Oklahoma City Police air support came to the location as well as K-9 units and agents. The suspect was found hiding under some brush by several homes. The investigation of this incident led Special Agent Paul Cornett and Chief Agent Flowers with sheriff's deputies and OCPD Detectives to a location in northwest Oklahoma City where the stolen tractor was to be delivered and sold for \$5000. The John Deere 4755 tractor was about 25 years old and the farmer who owned it had paid \$48,000 for it. When agents arrived at the

location in northwest Oklahoma City where the tractor was going to be sold, agents found a John Deere 4450 tractor attached to a 15' batwing mower parked beside the building. That tractor was found to be stolen from Logan County. A search of the property also found numerous other stolen pieces of equipment , such as, skid steers, trailers, trucks, cars, brush hog mowers, sprayers, and ATV's all stolen from Logan, Oklahoma, Canadian, Garfield, Major and McClain Counties. The value of the recovered stolen property is estimated to be approximately \$250,000.00 so far. Special Agents are continuing the investigation after busting this major agriculture theft ring and will be presenting numerous felony charges against at least three or more suspects responsible for these crimes.






In July, Chief Agent Flowers and Pilot Rick Dodson were flying the law enforcement helicopter in Caddo and Canadian County in an attempt to locate some stray cattle running along the Canadian River. During the flight, we found a 160 acre ranch that is located in Canadian County that was covered with wild marijuana. Chief Agent Flowers contacted the land owner and he said the marijuana has been growing there for years and he can't get rid of it. His cattle are eating it as well and that is also causing the spread of the seeds in his fields causing more of the hemp to grow. Flying in the area from Union City to Hinton, we also found acres and acres of wild marijuana growing mainly on farm land by creeks and the Canadian River. Chief Agent Flowers met with DEA Assistant Special Agent in Charge of Oklahoma and discussed a federal program the DEA is operating to eradicate this problem. The federal program will be tested in

August in Blaine County to eradicate a 160 acre field where the wild hemp is growing. Once the program is found to be successful, the program will be offered to Sheriffs across the state to eradicate the hemp from their counties.

Special Agent Ricky Rushing presented 24 counts of felony charges against two suspects in Seminole County for stealing cattle from three livestock owners. The suspects were stealing cattle in the middle of the night from ranchers in the Seminole area and selling them at the Bristow and Holdenville sale barns. Both suspects were arrested and are currently out of jail on bond.



Special Agent Paul Cornett closed an investigation in July where he presented felony charges against four suspects in Caddo County where they attempted to steal numerous head of cattle. The suspects had penned up cattle on some property and set up panels to funnel the cattle into a stock trailer. The suspects were scared off by a passing motorist during their attempted theft. Agents located the suspects after following several leads identifying the convicted felons. The suspects admitted their crimes to agents and all four suspects have been charged with numerous felony charges.







**AUGUST 2015 BOARD REPORT
 AGRICULTURE LABORATORY SERVICES
 (June 2015 Activities)**

QUALITY ASSURANCE SECTION: (Tanna Kilpatrick, Quality Manager)

A final response for the ODEQ audit for the Inorganic Section was completed and submitted. It described the corrective actions taken from the evaluation. The corrective actions included a few edits to documents, some system maintenance, preventative actions, and some helpful tracking features. This accreditation program requires an evaluation every two years so the next audit can be expected in February of 2017.

Two auditors from FSIS (Food Safety and Inspection Service) came to evaluate the two sections that analyze samples from the State MPI (Meat and Poultry Inspection) Program, the General Chemistry Section and the Food and Dairy Section. This is the first time in a number of years that this program has performed on-site evaluations. The auditors gave helpful feedback and the Laboratory should receive an audit report soon.

After multiple audits (internal and external), for several months, the QA Manager was able to catch up on some quality system maintenance which included editing of documents, and making improvements to the QA system.

The routine distribution of quality control samples to respective sections of the Laboratory was ongoing this month. Collection and submission of data to the respective study groups for statistical analysis was conducted. The completed data from various PT programs was evaluated and appropriate PT reports were issued to the sections involved.

CONTINUING ACTIVITIES REPORT: (Brenda Snodgrass, Agricultural Services Administrator II)

Sample Master Laboratory Information Management Software (LIMS) phased implementation is complete. All functions of the legacy TLB-LIMS database have been replaced and additional LIMS functions have been added. Activities for June 2015 include:

- The Sample Master configuration and validation was completed for the Pesticide and Serology Sections. Meetings were held with the Pesticide Section on June 1st and 3rd and with the Serology Section on June 4th.
- Cassandra Kontas, Technical Manager, identified the users' need for a broad system query to provide considerable flexibility to the Section Supervisors and Laboratory Management for reporting statistical information from the LIMS. The Statistical and Management Query is nearing completion along with a User's Guidance Instruction. The training session for using the query is planned in July 2015 for all Section Supervisors, the Section back-up staff, and the Laboratory Administrative staff.
- Cassandra developed and implemented an Invoice Export report for bulk invoices for the Sections each month. Project Manager Brenda Snodgrass continues working on the format of the Sample Master QuickBooks export function so that invoiced services are correctly mapped to QuickBooks for invoice generation and reconciliation.
- Cassandra continues to optimize Sample Master LIMS reports and user functionality for all Sections as they are brought on-line in the Sample Master LIMS, in order to provide better productivity tools to the Laboratory users.
- As of June 30, 2015, the General Chemistry, Inorganic, Pesticide, Seed and Serology Sections have been fully migrated to Sample Master. This completes all Sections that were using the TLB-LIMS system.
- The TLB User interface (web-server) is scheduled for shut-down (decommissioning) on July 10, 2015. Project Manager Brenda Snodgrass requested an extension of the originally scheduled shut-down date of July 1st from OMES-Information Services Division in order to access end-of-year data for FY2015 and finalize validation of the Pesticide and Serology Section configurations and migration.
- The Dairy and Food Safety Section is scheduled to be configured, validated and migrated by the end of September 2015.
- The Sample Master Project Team, including Laboratory Director Paul Kerr, Assistant Director Brenda Snodgrass, Technical Manager Cassandra Kontas, and Administrative

Officer Jamie Pirrong, held a status meeting on June 3rd, 10th, 17th and 24th with additional updates made by email and short verbal briefings.

National Organization and Committee Representation activities for June 2015 include:

- Association of American Feed Control Officials (AAFCO) Quality Assurance/Quality Control Workgroup (QA/QC WG) - Co-chair Brenda Snodgrass participated in a monthly conference call on June 25, 2015. The QA/QC WG Co-chairs discussed the update to be given at the AAFCO 2015 Annual Meeting in Denver, Colorado in August.
- Association of Public Health Laboratories (APHL) Data Acceptance Work Group - Brenda Snodgrass participated in a conference call on June 5th to continue work on guidelines for non-accredited laboratories to submit Food Safety inspections and test results to the FDA and USDA for regulatory action.
- Food Emergency Response Network (FERN) - Brenda Snodgrass participated in a FERN-wide conference call on June 25th. The topics covered included FDA program and training updates, available methods, updates on completed and scheduled proficiency tests, and a demonstration of new features on the FERN website.
- Partnership for Food Protection (PFP) - Laboratory Science Workgroup (WG) State Co-chair Brenda Snodgrass participated in the WG member-wide conference call on June 11th and participated in Chapter Sub-group conference calls on June 5th and 8th. The PFP LS WG is comprised of ~ 45 state and federal regulatory volunteers representing food and feed testing laboratories, as well as Project Managers from APHL and AFDO. In June of 2015, the PFP LS WG volunteers began reviewing and updating the FDA *Food/Feed Testing Laboratories Best Practices Manual (Draft 2013)* (LBPM Draft) Chapters. All seven chapters (Accreditation, Regulatory Annex, Proficiency Testing, Sampling, Methods, Worksheets, and Reporting) along with the appendices (Acknowledgements, Supporting Documents Links, and Glossary) are under review with expected revisions to be completed by July 2016.

OKLAHOMA BUREAU OF STANDARDS: (Richard Gonzales, Metrologist III

A total of forty customers sent in standards for calibration during the month of June. Of these, sixteen were from out of state. These out of state customers accounted for twenty-six percent of the total standards calibrated and fifty-four percent of the fees generated. The State of Arkansas Metrology Laboratory submitted their Mass Echelon III standards for calibration.


On March 6, 2015 the control system for the Bureau was modified by the DCAM Services Section. Since that time, the Section has experienced continued issues with temperature and humidity control. The Section continues to work diligently with DCAM to resolve the issues.

All calibration schedules are currently being maintained and the lead times for requesting calibrations are under the thirty working days that the Laboratory strives to maintain.

James Willson resigned from State service on June 2, 2015. This placed an unusual burden on the remaining two metrologists as the month of June had a workload schedule for three

metrologists. On a positive note, Erin Albers was welcomed into the Section as its newest metrologist. The addition of Erin has had a significant positive effect on the workload distribution in the Bureau, but he still has much to learn as his training continues.

The follow up from the Quality Audit has been delayed until July.




DAIRY/FOOD SAFETY SECTION: (Brian McDowell, Clinical Laboratory Scientist IV)


The month of June was not a routine testing month for Dairy sampling; it was for ice cream, import dairy products and make up testing. All of the dairy plants and 97% of the farms received minimum testing (which is four times within a six month period), from the January to June 2015 cycle all dairies not meeting the minimum requirement were goat dairies. There were no antibiotic or aflatoxin violations found in June. The Food Safety testing in June consisted of 61 E. coli (STEC), 62 Salmonella and nine Listeria tests with one E. coli (STEC) violation. This month, analyst Bryan Fritz completed a FERN training course for Detection of Salmonella in Foods at the Minnesota Department of Agriculture. On June 17th – 18th the Section had its first

USDA-FSIS Audit for the Meat Testing Program. Additionally this month, the Section participated in a FERN proficiency test for Salmonella.


Total Determinations

GENERAL CHEMISTRY SECTION: (Ryan Lerch, Environmental/Chemical Laboratory Scientist IV)

The Section received 276 total samples including 208 feeds, 61 fertilizers, five limes and two meats. 223 total sample reports were issued and 1351 total determinations were made, 132 of which exceeded analytical variance.

- 147 feed samples were completed. 693 determinations were reported with 73 exceeding analytical variance.
- 72 fertilizer samples were completed. 646 determinations were reported with 59 exceeding analytical variance.
- Four lime samples were completed. Twelve determinations were reported with zero exceeding analytical variance.

A new chemist started on 6/8/15. The Section has several new employees and is working diligently to get them trained as well as keep up with sample turnaround.

Humidity has been very high in the Section, and the grinding room has been shut down due to incompatible conditions for three full days and three half days throughout the month limiting productivity. The Laboratory is working with DCAM to resolve these issues. The main Laboratory chiller is not functioning as expected. Once the chiller issues are corrected, the Laboratory expects humidity issues to improve.

The ICP was down on 6/16/15 due to problems with the house compressed air, but the issue was resolved in a timely manner.

The combustion analyzer, which analyzes samples for protein and nitrogen content, was out of service from 6/19/15 through 6/25/15 as the new analyst and others in the Laboratory worked to troubleshoot where a problem was and resolved the issue.

Average turnaround time of samples for June was 10.83 days for official feeds (18-day goal), 13.00 days for official fertilizers (18-day goal), and 9.00 days for limes (10-day goal). Thirteen samples were reported after the turn-around time goals. Results for three proficiency test samples were received in June; of 25 analyses, 25 passed.

One Section meeting was held in June for reviews and updates on quality and safety issues, updates on division and section announcements, and to assign duties for a section-wide project.

The Section is helping the Pesticides Laboratory with their workload while one of their chemists is out for an extended leave of absence. One chemist will be spending 20 hours per week assisting and one chemist will be spending five hours per week assisting.

One corrective action was initiated and finalized this month concerning a failing quality control. The problem has been remedied.





INORGANIC SECTION: (Emily Curry, Environmental/Chemical Laboratory Scientist IV)

Analysts continue to coordinate with the General Chemistry Section to use its acid scrubbing hood to run TKN analysis while the Section is without a working hood. Quotes and plans have been received and reviewed by the Laboratory, and it is hoped that the new hood can be purchased soon. TKN analysis capacity has been cut in half by having to share the hood space, so turnaround time has been affected. However, the chemist is doing a remarkable job of compensating for decreased capacity by planning extra digestion cycles and has managed the sample load as well as can be expected.

Due in part to budget cuts, OCC ceased sampling on three weekly monitoring projects at the end of June. This is expected to have a significant impact on revenue, resulting in approximately 2,800 fewer tests a year, or about 15% of total tests performed. The Section has temporarily picked up some additional monthly testing for a Grand Lake project on which the OCC is working, but this will likely last only a month or two until OCC can finalize EPA paperwork with the Grand Lake testing facilities.

The Section will meet with OCC before the end of July for a regularly scheduled quarterly meeting. The Section had the opportunity to meet with AEMS to discuss LMFO sampling, but declined when they informed the Section that they were satisfied with all Laboratory Services and would be devoting most of the meeting to issues with IT.


PESTICIDE SECTION: (Steven Moser, Environmental/Chemical Laboratory Scientist IV)

In June, the Section received 116 samples and completed 94 samples. This included 268 determinations on 37 different analytes/scans, resulting in 682 tests being completed.




Percent of samples received in June by type:

As the charts show the number of samples received in June is about the same as the past three-year average.

In June, the Section had two different sample sets (rush and urgent) that stopped or slowed testing on the regular samples while we focused on those sets. This is the second month in a row we have had rush and/or urgent samples that has impacted turnaround time.

In June, the Section had five different instrument related issues that delayed testing of samples. Of these, two were mass spectrometer related, two were selective detector related, and the nitrogen generator went down. When the nitrogen generator goes down all LC-MSMS analysis has to stop. The issue was quickly identified and a part was ordered and installed. All of the issues were resolved in-house.

The issue with the HPLC-MS Ion Trap is still not resolved. The Section is looking for secondary parts to fix this instrument and may have found a used version that the Section can acquire for free, and will continue to try to resolve this issue as time permits internally as outside support is no longer available due to the age of the instrument.

SEED SECTION: (Wade Krivanek, State Seed Program Administrator)

Sample records for the Seed Section indicate a total of 3,415 samples were received for testing during fiscal year 2015. The final numbers were down by eight percent when compared to 2014. The decrease was largely due to receiving less service work as peanut samples and acreage declined throughout the state. Regulatory samples from CPS were up by 22% however and inventories of all summer crops have been holding strong.

Section staff remained unchanged during the fiscal year with three full time seed analysts. Sampling became heavy during the spring and fall months but turnaround times for the Section remained basically consistent with previous years.

Wheat harvest is now mostly complete across the state. Reports from the Oklahoma Crop Improvement Association are again indicating that there will likely be a mixed bag of quality for this year's wheat seed. Several foundation plots in central areas had to be abandoned due to low test weight and germination quality. There could possibly be shortages of foundation seed for certain varieties. Early germination results for samples already tested at the Seed Laboratory are ranging from the low 80's to mid-90's. A small amount of sprout damage has been discovered as well.

SEROLOGY SECTION: (Pete Bourns, Clinical/Laboratory Scientist IV)

Brucellosis testing on cattle, swine, deer, buffalo, llamas, alpacas, goat samples, and other exotics submitted during June 2015 totaled 1,141 samples of which four were A.I.S. state request samples. There were 1,031 swine samples of which all were billable. There was one feral pig, no slaughter pigs, and no A.I.S. Sale barn samples requested. Revenue for Brucellosis samples was for 406 cattle and other animal species.

There were no milk samples submitted for the Brucella Ring test. There was only one screen test positive Brucellosis sample for June that required further confirmation testing on other Brucellosis tests. The number of Brucellosis samples was mid-range between the previous two years.

Pseudorabies samples submitted in June totaled 1,031 samples. There were no slaughter pigs, no stockyard pigs, no feral pigs, and no A.I.S. requested samples this month. There was one sample that screen tested positive, but was called negative after retesting. Total revenue for June 2015 in Pseudorabies testing was for 434 samples. The number of Pseudorabies samples was higher than previous two years.

EIA test sample numbers for June 2015 totaled 49 samples. There were three field positives for EIA, all of which were negative after confirmation testing. Revenue was for 25 of the 49 samples. Twenty-four of the 49 samples were A.I.S. state request samples.

The Section is now sending all field positive EIA samples to NVSL in Ames, Iowa. This is to comply with Federal Guidelines on the handling of suspect E.I.A. samples. Sharing of this information helps to keep testing procedures consistent with different facilities and also help to monitor test kit performances. Samples have been sent for the last two months and the program is working very well.

OKLAHOMA FORESTRY SERVICES BOARD REPORT

Mid-June through July Activities

Conserving, enhancing and protecting the forest resources of Oklahoma for present and future generations

We are in the process of changing our board report format to better reflect the priorities of the National Cohesive Wildland Fire Management Strategy which include Resilient Landscapes, Fire Adapted Communities, and Safe and Effective Wildfire Response.

RESILIENT LANDSCAPES

Landowner assistance programs

T&E Workshop. Several Division foresters attended a workshop on Threatened and Endangered Species, presented by the Department of Wildlife Conservation at Lake Arcadia on July 15. There are currently 21 listed species in Oklahoma, including the American Burying Beetle, Red-Cockaded Woodpecker, 4 bat species, and various shiners, darters, mussels and other species. There are 3 candidate species requiring a listing determination in 2016. In addition, 29 species have been petitioned for listing, with USFWS actions expected in 2017 or later. It is likely that T&E species considerations will continue to merit greater attention in the future. To help address workload concerns the USFWS has proposed a revision of rules that govern the petitioning process.

Research on Shelterbelts. We provided information to Dr. Tony VanWinkle, a Postdoctoral Research Fellow at OU, who is working on a statewide project looking at the severe weather, drought, land use and water issues in four different watersheds representing varied ecoregions. His focus area is the upper Washita and specifically Caddo County where he will be conducting interviews with farmers and ranchers and other land users/managers over the next year. He is interested in information about these early tree plantings, as they are looking at both contemporary and historic conditions and adaptations to Oklahoma's climate variability.

NRCS Agreement. We are planning a joint meeting between our foresters and personnel from the NRCS in southeastern Oklahoma to discuss our current cooperative agreement for delivery of forestry services under EQIP and the Conservation Stewardship Program. The meeting will be held in Wilburton on August 13.

Shortleaf Pine Website. The restoration of shortleaf pine in its native range is both a state and region focus. The Southern Regional Extension Forester announced the launch of a new website devoted to Shortleaf Pine (www.shortleafpine.net).

Stewardship Geodatabase. In support of our federal reporting requirements, Staff Forester Dieter Rudolph notified our foresters of the 25 Forest Stewardship plans selected for monitoring this year. Foresters will determine whether these landowners have implemented their plans or not. This data is used in the SMART reporting system to estimate the total acres under active management in the program, as reported to Congress and OMB.

Nursery and Tree Improvement

Forest Regeneration Center. Preliminary seedling inventories will be conducted by early August to determine the impacts of heavy rainfall in May and June and the late sowing of some species.

Water Quality

Water Quality Forester. We have received no new applicants for our Water Quality Forester position, but continue to recruit.

BMP Revision. We met with Gayle Hiner, OSU Ag Communications, in Stillwater on July 9 to begin the layout of our revised Forestry BMP Guidelines.

Educational activities

Teacher's Climate Summit – Jeri Irby, our education coordinator partnered with Oklahoma Project Learning Tree and Oklahoma Mesonet to offer the state's first Teacher's Climate Summit on July 28 & 29. Attended by secondary science teachers from across the state, the workshop provided them with in depth climate science curriculum, resources and activities to use in their classrooms.

Forest Heritage Center. We participated in the quarterly meeting of the FHC Board of Directors held on July 16. There was considerable discussion concerning the ongoing discussion with Tourism and their desire to institute an admission fee and restrict space used by our museum and educational program. The FHC Board provided funding support for additional help to conduct Camp Discover (our annual camp for children which teaches them how to explore the forest through art), July 7-9. The Camp was very successful, and attracted 23 young people.

WITF Field Visit. Planning continues for this year's Walk in the Forest, to be held at the Regional Park in Ardmore on October 17. A follow-up planning meeting will be held on August 26.

Economic Impact Publication. We began work with Leslie Boby of the Southern Regional Extension Forester's office to develop a publication on the economic importance of forestry in Oklahoma using a format developed through the Southern Group of State Foresters (SGSF).

International Paper Mill is World's Largest. As part of the OFA Board meeting, mill managers from the IP Paper Mill at Valliant provided information about the paper mill that may be of interest to help appreciate the size and scope of the operation.

The \$100 million plant was completed by Weyerhaeuser Company in 1971, and was sold to IP in 2008. The #3 paper machine was added in 1981, idled in 2008 and restarted in April 2015 after a \$100 mill investment by IP. The current value of the mill is over a billion dollars. Product lines manufactured at the plant are linerboard (smooth surfaces of cardboard) and corrugated medium board (used for the waffled interior of cardboard). These products are made by others into shipping containers for a wide variety of applications, including fruit primarily in the western states, meat (Tyson) and similar products. The Valliant mill is not only the largest in the IP system, but in the world, based upon tons of output per day (4,889). Restarting the third machine increased local employment from 320 to 370 direct employees, plus 18 new private contractors. Annual payroll increased from \$45 to \$51 million. IP purchases an estimated \$400 million in goods and services annually to support operations.

Indirect employment is estimated at 5 to 1 ratio. With 600 direct employees, the company provides an additional 3,000 indirect jobs in the region.

Forest Inventory Analysis (FIA)

We receive many inquiries from organizations and individuals for information and data related to Oklahoma's forests to help determine the feasibility of bringing sawmills and other forest industry to the state. FIA data offers the information needed to verify and quantify the forest resources of the state.

OFS FIA crews finished the 2014 Inventory in mid-January. The 2015 Inventory requires data collection on 713 research plots (64 more than 2014). In January, data collection in eastern Oklahoma started the 9th cycle, and it is year seven in the 10-year cycle for Western Oklahoma counties.


Historical state-wide flooding in late spring left the FIA crews scrambling for higher ground. Therefore, the typically organized pattern of first east and then west inventory has been scattered throughout the 77 counties to allow creeks, rivers, etc., recede to more normal levels. Crews have managed to record data on 186 research plots, which is only 26% of the total required for the 2015 data collection year.

FIA foresters spend most of their time in the field and commonly interact with landowners curious about their forests and woodlands. While FIA crews were working in southwestern Oklahoma, we received an inquiry from a landowner concerned about the health of his cottonwoods along the Salt Fork River.



These photos were taken from Highway 62 between Altus and Drake. Tree damage and mortality is widespread. The most likely cause is several years of drought, even though 2015 has been very wet.





We welcome our newest addition to the FIA crew, Reilly Cloud. Reilly is a recent graduate of Oklahoma State University and began training as a FIA cruiser on June 15, 2015.

Thinking beyond today

OFA Board Meeting. The Oklahoma Forestry Association Board of Directors held its quarterly meeting at the International Paper mill in Valliant on July 23. Topics of discussion included Tree Farm, inviting the Oklahoma Woodland Owners Association to join OFA, use of Forest Inventory and Analysis program data, Pushmataha County logging road restrictions and others. OFA and other supporters recently sent letters to Dr. Coon at OSU inquiring about the Extension Forester vacancy.

Compatible Lands Foundation. We met with Robert Gregory of the Compatible Lands Foundation of Tulsa on July 20. This Foundation focuses on working with military bases to explore buffer opportunities. We shared information about the FIA program and how the data may be used in economic development activities.

Cooperative Meeting with Texas. We are planning a meeting with staff of the Texas A&M Forest Service on August 24-25. The purpose of the meeting is to explore common issues and opportunities to cooperate on multi-state federal grant projects.

FAP Update. Craig Marquardt continues to lead our efforts in revising the 2010 Forest Action Plan. We met with GIS Specialist Susan Langley on July 24 to determine progress for completion of the GIS data layers prior to running issue analysis and models.


Urban & Community Forestry




FIRE ADAPTED COMMUNITIES

AGRICULTURE RESOURCES SECTION

Feed Program Performance

During this reporting period there were a total of 143 official feed samples analyzed, with 673 feed determinations made from these samples. These determinations resulted in the issuance of 28 violations for feeds or feed ingredients that did not meet established tolerances based on their guaranteed analysis. The majority of these violations were issued for products deficient in crude protein. Violations were also issued for feed products that did not meet their guarantees for crude fat, crude fiber, calcium, phosphorus, salt, and vitamin A. Twelve stop sale orders were also issued for feed products with severe deviations from their guaranteed analysis. Three of these stop sales were issued for products deficient in copper. The remaining stop sales were issued for products with deviations in their crude protein, crude fat, crude fiber, zinc, and vitamin A content.

The following tables show a two month comparison of label violations and stop sale orders issued by the Department for feed products that did not meet their guaranteed analysis.

Anhydrous Ammonia Safety Video Conference

Lance Kunneman, fertilizer program administrator, presented ODAFF's rules and safety equipment requirements for anhydrous ammonia storage facilities at the annual anhydrous ammonia safety video conference. Tay Rucker, investigator for the Office of Hazardous Materials Safety with the U. S. Department of Transportation, gave a presentation on the federal regulations for anhydrous ammonia nurse tanks. Gary Cless, with Fairbanks Equipment, made the final presentation for the conference on anhydrous ammonia properties, demonstrated how to transfer anhydrous ammonia from storage tanks to nurse tanks, and covered new equipment available for anhydrous ammonia. The conference is sponsored by The Triangle Insurance Company, Oklahoma Agribusiness Retailers Association and ODAFF. The safety program was streamed live from the Autry Technology Center in Enid on July 15th to 216 participants across the state at technology centers in Weatherford, Goodwell, Enid, Lawton, Altus, and Omega. Assisting with the conference at the satellite locations were the ag resource field inspectors Steve Morris, Rusty Edenborough, Wendy Meyer, Gary Smith, Keith Neugebauer, and Joe Privett. The safety conference helps the anhydrous ammonia dealers meet EPA safety training requirements for their employees.

Weights & Measures Program Board Report

The large capacity scale technicians inspected 190 vehicle scales, 3 livestock scales and 52 platform scales. There were 50 scales rejected for repairs and 5 were taken out of service.

Weights & Measures inspectors checked a total of 1,502 small scales during this period, 46 were rejected. There were 19 random pack inspections and 6 standard pack inspections, 2 received letters of warning. Additionally, 127 price verification inspections were conducted with letters of warning issued on 3 of those inspections. Fourteen letters of warning were sent to scale companies for not properly servicing the scales.


The weights & measures staff issued 23 service agency licenses & 87 device technician licenses.

Pesticide Sample Submissions for April - June 2015



Along with the above inspections CPS pesticide inspectors also took 48 non ag use samples, 90 ag use samples, 11 pesticide producing establishment samples and 55 market place samples for a two month total of 204 samples. The inspectors also participated in 16 certification and training activities. These activities include inspector training, CEU meetings, test sessions, pesticide applicator training and speaking at meetings.

Certification & Training Activities

Southern Region American Association of Pesticide Safety Educators (AAPSE)

June 2nd-5th, Certification and Training Administrator, Ryan Williams attended the Southern Region AAPSE meeting held in Lexington, KY. This meeting was hosted by Kentucky Pesticide Safety Education Program, topics of discussion included exam development, manual development, worker protection standard, pollinator protection, and training for new herbicide technologies.

Quality Assurance Project Plan & Quality Management Plan Training

June 23rd-25th, Certification and Training Administrator, Ryan Williams attended this three day workshop hosted by the Oklahoma Department of Environmental Quality. This training serves

as an orientation to the basic management issues associated with EPA's Quality Assurance Program and introduces participants to the Data Quality Objectives concept and process. This training focused on development of Quality Assurance Project Plans.

High Precision Injector System

Bill Taylor, Mike Vandeventer and Ryan Williams met with BASF chemical to discuss their new termite products and their new high pressure injector system. This machine will inject chemical under pressure along the foundation and do away with the need to dig a trench. They also met with Dr. Brad Kard and observed an experimental use application with this technology. This technology currently does not meet the state minimum standards for termite treatment. We are currently looking into the efficacy of this technology and if it would benefit the citizens of Oklahoma to change our rules to allow this type of treatment.




Figure 1: An Experimental use application using BASF's new high pressure injector system.

ENVIRONMENTAL RESOURCE AND HORTICULTURE SECTION

Cooperative Agricultural Pest Survey (CAPS)

Wood Commodity Survey

A visual and trapping survey of oak and pine pests is being conducted in 23 counties. Trapping is limited to high-risk sites that could serve as a pathway for invasive pests; in the case of this survey, state parks. State parks are at high-risk for infestation due to the constant influx of people and from firewood being transported into the park from out-of-state. Forty oak sites and twenty pine sites across the state are being surveyed for 13 oak and pine pests.

Emerald Ash Borer Survey

This year ODAFF has been tasked with evaluating 313 assigned sites as possible locations for EAB trapping. Inspectors set 225 purple prism traps and 15 green multi-funnel traps. This was the first year that the green multi-funnel traps were used. They have been shown to be more effective at trapping EAB and last for more than one trapping season. The remaining 88 assigned sites were voided due to accessibility, no ash tree available or landowner refusal. In addition, funding for this trapping program was cut by 25% so our overall site numbers were lowered as well. Currently, traps were just re-lured and samples are being returned for identification.

Imported Fire Ant Survey

This spring road surveys were started for imported fire ants in the counties that border the USDA quarantined area but were stopped due to the high summer temperatures. We will resume the surveys in the fall when temperatures decrease down to the active temperature range of 65°F and 95°F for imported fire ants. Within the quarantined area there are 39 active compliance agreements for nursery stock, ball & burlap, hay, sod, and sod moving equipment that allow for movement of those materials outside the quarantined area.

Karnal Bunt Survey

Field personnel submitted samples from grain elevators in Canadian, Grady, Alfalfa, Garfield, Kay, Harper, Texas, Greer, Harmon, Kiowa, Tillman, Blaine, Custer, and Dewey Counties. The number of samples coincides with the wheat yield reported in the Oklahoma Agricultural Statistics. We calculate an average of the wheat yield for five years and take a sample for every million bushels harvested. A total of 54 samples was projected for this year, however only 20 grain elevators chose to participate this year. Participation in the Karnal Bunt Survey is completely voluntary. The samples have been submitted to Dr. Bob Hunger at OSU for testing. He will also be looking for flag smut, based on example slides provided by the USDA.

Asian Defoliator Survey

The Asian Defoliator Survey is on its second year of survey following the Asian Gypsy Moth find at McAlester Army Ammunition Plant. Oklahoma is one of the first states to receive Farm Bill Funding for an Asian Defoliator Survey. The survey is aimed at trapping for Asian defoliating moths at sites that may receive large shipments from Asian countries; specifically army bases, distribution centers and warehouses, industrial parks, and airports. Inspectors have set 190 red delta traps at 17 sites in the state and are continuing to monitor them.

State CAPS Committee Meeting

The annual State CAPS Committee Meeting was hosted at OSU with 11 members from ODAFF, USDA, OSU, and OU in attendance. This annual meeting is held to discuss current and up-and-coming surveys for the following year. Elizabeth Nguyen led the meeting and possible surveys for pine and grape commodities were proposed by Jen Olson from OSU. There was also an in-depth discussion on emerald ash borer and its current infestation status in the U.S.

Outreach

CAPS has partnered with OK Forestry Services to support the Don't Move Firewood campaign. Metal signs and rack cards have been created and will be distributed to every Oklahoma state park. The signs and rack cards detail the dangers of moving firewood and the spread of invasive pests.

TCD/EAB Hands-On Workshop: Knoxville, TN

State survey coordinator, Elizabeth Nguyen, attended the Thousand Cankers Disease/Emerald Ash Borer hands-on workshop in Knoxville, TN June 15th -18th. There, she received hands-on training on how to identify symptoms of TCD and EAB in walnut and ash trees. Attendees were also trained to identify walnut twig beetle and EAB and process samples of each.

Plant Protection Program

Invasive Plant or Ornamental

An invasive plant has the ability to thrive and spread aggressively outside its native range and can cause damage to the environment, economy and/or human health. Some plant species may be an excellent ornamental plant in one environment and become invasive in another environment. For example, butterfly bush, *Buddleia davidii*, a free-flowering shrub is an excellent landscape choice for the Midwest and Central Plains but it is considered an invasive plant by several states on the west and east coasts. Recently an Oklahoma grower shipped butterfly bush to Oregon where it is prohibited as an invasive plant so it had to be destroyed at a nursery site in Oregon where it was shipped. Unfortunately, the grower and the certifying official were unaware of the Oregon regulations prior to

shipment. In Oklahoma, this plant is a common one grown by many nurserymen and is available for purchase at nearly any garden center.

Nursery inspections of shipments conducted by field inspectors are a key for growers shipping plants to other states because they inform them of regulatory requirements of that state and they certify the shipments based on them meeting the states requirements.

While it is against federal and state laws to grow or move (intentionally or unintentionally) species considered invasive, it is a state’s regulations and weed laws that govern the introduction or destruction of invasive plants. Butterfly bush is not on the prohibited plants list administered by the Washington State Department of Agriculture, but some nurseries have volunteered to stop selling it due to its danger to natural resources.



Boxwood Blight in Pennsylvania

Multiple detections of boxwood blight have been found in more than 80 Pennsylvania retail garden centers as the result of routine inspections in July. The plants originated from a grower in Oregon. Cool, wet, rainy springs followed by warm temperatures, rain events and humid conditions are ideal for the disease. Several Oklahoma growers are large producers of boxwood that is shipped all across the U.S. inspectors and nursery scouts have been alerted to be extra diligent while inspecting boxwood grown on the nursery sites and boxwood plants that are shipped to Oklahoma garden centers from other sources.



Honeybee Update

Dr. Don Molnar, Apiary Program Manager, and Eric Pearson, Apiary Inspector, gave a presentation on Africanized Honeybees to about 75 workers of the Western Farmers Electric Cooperative in Anadarko on June 5th. The presentation was given to the workers of the electric cooperative during one of their monthly safety trainings meetings. The presentation covered the origin of the Africanized honey bee, its spread in the Americas, how it differs from the European honey bee and what to do if you encounter a colony of aggressive bees while on the job.



The map in Figure 5 shows the counties where Africanized honey bees have been detected yearly through 2014.

In June and first part of July we got a lot of calls from the public about bees on their property, either in the house or in or on a tree that they wanted removed, Most calls were referred to the swarm catcher list on the honey bee page of ODAFF's web page.

GIS Program

Here are the major GIS accomplishments for June 2015:




Figure 6: Stranded cattle after major flood.

- Drew map of cattle stranded by flooding for Investigative Services see Figure 6.
- Worked on migrating OLD web mapping server to new server for agency.
- Drew large map for Avian Influenza outbreak exercise for AIS.
- Drew many Drift Complaint maps for CPS.
- Worked on renewing ESRI Software Maintenance Contract for agency.
- Worked on installing GIS computers. Began installing new GIS computer.




Figure 7: Cleveland and McClain county imported fire ant survey.

- Drew special map for Imported Fire Ant Survey project for CPS see Figure 7.
- Downloaded and imported GPS data for pesticide facilities drift complaints, and scales.
- Continued ongoing training for ODAFF staff in GIS software.
- Completed 41 work requests and worked on 16 others.

Environment Program

Constructed Wetland at BFN Nursery

On July 7th the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry participated in an Oklahoma State University workshop in Coweta entitled Pesticide Reduction Strategies for Nursery Runoff. The discussion is based around a wetland being constructed at Berry Family Nursery using an USDA Integrated Pest Management Extension Grant along with matching monies from the nursery. The workshop had classroom lecture in the morning and a tour of the field site at Berry Family Nursery in the afternoon. Topics included a background on pesticides properties, transport, and removal processes, and best management practices for pesticide reduction in runoff.




Figure 8: Soon to be completed wetland at Berry Family Nursery

This is a test site for research to determine the best way through a wetland system to remove pesticides and nutrients from irrigation tail waters prior to it leaving the nursery. The wetland contains 6 different cell for water to flow through to filter out chemical and nutrients. There is growing media in each cell with varying degrees of compost and sand as well as cells that contain growing plants and those without any plants. Testing done on the water leaving each cell should provide information as to what is most effective in removing contaminants from the water.

Dr. Gorczyca-Southerland had her baby on June 22. Because of Dr. G's maternity leave, I don't have a full description of the activities in her programs. With the great help of Rhonda Keener, Betty Baxter, Janice Montgomery, Nichole Carillo, Sherrie Davis, Tammy Hagar, and Teresa Bragg we have been getting the data entered into our database. I've been filling in for her as needed in spots. So even though we miss her and are ready for her to return August 24, we have managed to get the work done.

Animal Disease Traceability:

We continue to work on the Ultra High Frequency tag project. Bill Golightly, who is APHIS VS' Animal ID Coordinator has visited CRI feeders in Guymon. They are not set up to fully utilize the tags and equipment, so we are working with Excel Feedlot in Watonga to extend the project. The dairy heifers will be moved soon so we will have an opportunity to see how the readers work with them.

Animal Technology Advisory Committee:

No issues were brought to the attention of the committee during this time period.

Aquaculture:

We issued six new aquaculture licenses this year and our inspectors are in the process of inspecting their facilities.

Biologics:

Dr. Gorczyca escorted two 4th year veterinary student interns on a tour of SolidTech Animal Health, Inc. SolidTech is in Newcastle and has patented a method of packaging vaccine into a dual dose pellet.

Cattle Programs:

Dr. Gary Stone is the director of our Johne's Disease program. Johne's Disease is caused by a bacterium called Mycobacterium avian ss paratuberculosis. It causes inflammation and thickening of the last portion of the small intestine. It causes serious diarrhea and rapid weight loss. There is no treatment for the disease. It is a very serious disease of cattle and costs the industry a lot of money, but many investigators believe there may be a link between Johne's Disease in cattle and Crohn's Disease in humans.

Foundation in Noble, called for volunteers through the Oklahoma Medical Reserve Corps, and had about 25 volunteers respond. It gave a portion of our Incident Command Team a chance to develop a plan and follow it through, and gave the volunteers the opportunity to work within an Incident Management Team.

Equine Programs:

There were no new equine cases for EIA, Piroplasmosis, or CEM.

We are collecting information and documentation that will allow ODAFF AIS to take over monitoring quarantine stations for Contagious Equine Metritis. We believe this will

make it more economical and convenient for producers to import horses into Oklahoma from countries where CEM is endemic.

FDA Tissue Residue Cases:

There was no activity during this time period.

Farmed Cervidae Programs:

Unfortunately it has been another bad summer already for many whitetail deer farmers in regards to disease. Epizootic hemorrhagic disease (EHD) and blue tongue (BT) have hit hard for the previous four summers and again this summer. Generally, the disease incidence is highest in August and September, and Dr. Roach has heard many stories of herd die-offs. In addition to these deaths, some producers experienced deaths from flooding and lightning strike earlier in the summer.

Dr. Roach received notice of two trace-forward animals in Oklahoma that originated from the same Wisconsin premises as a chronic wasting disease infected animal found in Ohio. AIS had records to show that one of these animals had moved back to Wisconsin, and the second was still in Oklahoma. The producer in Oklahoma who still owns this animal has been contacted and movement restrictions have been placed on this individual animal. Luckily, the animal was exposed almost 4.5 years ago, and according to USDA protocol it will only need to be restricted from movement for another 6 months (5 years from last known exposure to the positive animal). The risk on this animal is low, but we are still closely monitoring it.

Dr. Roach submitted the annual report to the USDA for the chronic wasting disease herd certification program. This report and corresponding approval from the USDA renews Oklahoma's status for this program allowing Oklahoma participants to move their animals interstate.

All tuberculosis suspect farmed whitetail deer have been tested negative and quarantines released.

Dr. Roach, Dr. Stone, and I held a meeting with an accredited veterinarian who has recently been performing sloppy work for several farmed cervidae herds over the last year. This veterinarian acknowledged most of these oversights, and we feel that this veterinarian's work will be much improved moving forward. If not, we can remove her certification to perform these regulatory duties on behalf of the state.

One farmed cervidae licensee who failed to identify his animals according to regulations has contacted Dr. Roach after receiving a notice of violation. He has made arrangements to sell the animals in the near future, provided documentation of the sale, and has agreed to pay the administrative penalty.

Feral Swine:

Dr. Roach held training for AIS livestock inspectors and VMOs for feral swine investigations. Two cases have already been assigned to field personnel to determine if

feral swine have been illegally transported, maintained, or sold. Most of these investigations stem from Facebook postings, Craigslist postings, or direct complaints.

Foreign Animal Disease:

The Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza outbreak appears to be almost over for the time being. All states except Iowa have released most of the quarantines and control zones and many of the houses have repopulated. Iowa continues to struggle with disposal of the poultry and so are running behind on most aspects of their response.

Vesicular Stomatitis Virus is back this summer. Cases have been diagnosed in Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, and Wyoming so far. As was the case last year, Colorado seems to be hit the hardest so far. We are getting reports of horses with lesions consistent with VSV and are investigating those cases. To date we have found no cases.

Outreach:

On July 9 our AIS Field Staff was in for the quarterly meeting. We discussed the planning for our HPAI Reconnaissance exercise and other issues.

On July 16 I attended the Central Oklahoma Veterinary Medical Association meeting and gave a presentation about Animal Disease Traceability and some of our other programs.

On July 19 I attended Oklahoma Livestock Marketing Association's annual meeting and visited with them about animal health and Trichomoniasis.

On July 21 I did an interview with KOCO Channel 5 about the dangers of cuddling and kissing chickens. We also discussed Avian Influenza and other health issues.

On July 23 I attended the Oklahoma Cattlemen's Association convention and took part in a panel discussion of FDA's Veterinary Feed Directive program.

Poultry Programs:

We responded to 21 sick bird/dead bird cases in the time period represented. No reportable diseases were discovered in these cases.

We were notified in June of an Iowa flock diagnosed with High Path Avian Influenza (HPAI) that had shipped peafowl eggs and quail eggs to two separate Oklahoma premises. The Oklahoma recipients were contacted and the flocks quarantined. The potentially exposed eggs tested negative for HPAI and all eggs including direct-contact eggs in the same incubator were destroyed out of an abundance of caution. We monitored flock health and conducted surveillance testing on all sick/dead birds for a 14 day time period. There were no abnormal mortality events in these flocks and all sick/dead birds tested negative for HPAI. The flocks have been released from quarantine.

We conducted a "Reconnaissance Exercise" on June 21 in Sequoyah County. If a poultry flock is diagnosed with HPAI, the normal protocol involves locating/documenting/visiting every home or property within a 6.2 mile radius from the

affected flock. The poultry flocks identified within this "Control Area" would then be tested to ascertain if there was spread of the disease. All of our field personnel plus some Forestry personnel participated by driving the roads within a simulated control area and documenting each home or property, the address, and the GPS coordinates. This training will help us be better prepared if HPAI hits Oklahoma.

Dr. Roach, Dr. Gorczykca, and I met with Dr. Nancy Roberts of USDA Veterinary Services to learn how to use the USDA's Emergency Management Response System software to process electronic import permits for poultry coming from highly pathogenic avian influenza infected states.

Rabies in Livestock:

Dr. Roach and Melissa Pearson developed and released a press release regarding rabies vaccination and prevention. Although other topics were covered, the purpose of this was to educate and encourage our livestock exhibitors to vaccinate their show animals. Rabies cases are more common in livestock and equine than in companion animals, and exhibitors and parents will have daily close contact with these animals over the coming months.

There was one rabid horse in Kiowa County during this period. No other animals were likely exposed, and this case was unremarkable.

Sheep and Goat Programs:

No activity during this time period.

Swine Programs:

During this time period, there were only 17 porcine epidemic diarrhea virus (PEDv) positive lab accessions for commercial swine premises in Oklahoma. Zero premises were newly infected during this period and 15 were declared negative. This improvement is due to warm weather and herd immunity finally starting to develop in the industry.

Miscellaneous:

The legislature appropriated \$23,750 to be used for the Large Animal Veterinarian Incentive Program this year. The committee decided two equal awards to two young veterinarians who have started their own practices and who do a lot of food animal work.




I received a call from the Director of the Oklahoma Tourism Department. Someone made a complaint on their web page that the riding stable horses at Roman Nose State park were in poor physical condition and not being cared for properly. I asked Inspector Vicki Ernsting to investigate the complaint. As you can see, the horses were in very good condition and the investigation ended.

Dr. Roach and Jeanetta Cooper cooperatively educated and assisted a citizen concerned about contamination of his home with a zoonotic parasite of raccoons called "baylisascris". The citizen had determined that raccoons were living in the attic of his home, and he was concerned about infection of this parasite that may be present in raccoon feces. Since this parasite is transmitted fecal-orally, a severe threat was not present since the contamination was in the attic. Common cleaning and disinfecting practices with gloves and handwashing were recommended along with a referral to the Oklahoma Department of Health.

August 2015 Board Report for June-July 2015 Activities**

Introduction

WS responds to complaints from the public involving problems with wildlife throughout Oklahoma. WS Specialists conduct operational control programs for many of the complaints they receive to resolve these wildlife damage problems. During this period, these projects were conducted on an estimated 949,938 acres of land under agreement. Additionally, WS helped 372 persons and entities with technical assistance which involved providing information to cooperators so they can resolve problems themselves. Cooperators reported and WS Specialists verified wildlife damage of \$120,665 during this period. Beaver damages accounted for losses totaling \$21,600. Coyotes were responsible for a number of damage requests, primarily to livestock, with losses totaling \$12,100. Feral hog damages accounted for losses totaling \$81,300.

Providing Wildlife Services

Coyote Damage Management

In Osage County, a rancher requested help with coyotes that had killed a calf on his property. The Wildlife Services Division Coordinator responded to the request and verified that coyotes had killed the calf. The Coordinator used calling as a control method, and has removed three of the problem coyotes. Work continues and the damage control efforts are being monitored.

WS was contacted by a Nowata County rancher with coyote predation concerns. The rancher reported that coyotes were responsible for the loss of three calves valued at \$2,000. The WS Specialist responded to the request and verified that coyote were responsible for the loss. While verifying the predation, the Specialist observed an overwhelming number of coyotes in three of the ranchers calving pastures. The Specialist utilized the fixed-wing aircraft to remove 48 coyotes from the calving pastures. Work is complete at this time with no further losses reported to date. The rancher was instructed on several methods of environmental changes, harassment methods and legal harvest methods that can be utilized to try to prevent future losses.

A Garfield County cooperator contacted WS after coyotes killed eight sheep valued at \$994. The WS Specialist verified the damage and utilized snares to remove five coyotes. Work is continuing at this time.

A Roger Mills County cooperator contacted WS after coyotes killed a calf. The Specialist used leghold traps to capture three coyotes on the property. Work continues at this time.

Feral Hog Damage Management

A McIntosh County landowner contacted WS requesting assistance with a feral swine problem. The landowner reported that the feral swine had rooted his property and consumed a large quantity of watermelon and cantaloupe vines on his property. WS Specialist responded to the request and verified the feral swine were responsible for the damages on the property. The Specialist utilized thermal night vision equipment to remove two large boars from the damage area. A cage trap was also set on the property. Work continues at this time.

An Osage County rancher contacted WS and requested help with feral hogs that had been rooting up his pastures. WS Coordinator responded to the request, and verified that feral hogs were present and their rooting had caused damage to the property. The feral hogs were baited, and cage traps will be used to remove them. Work is ongoing.

WS received a request from a Jackson County producer after feral hogs destroyed several acres of pasture valued at \$2,000. The Specialist verified the damage and used cage traps to remove eighteen hogs from the property. Work continues at this time

A Dewey County landowner contacted WS after hogs rooted up several acres of pasture valued at \$1,000. The Specialist verified the damage and utilized dogs and shooting to remove eight hogs. Work is continuing at this time.

WS received a request from a Cimarron County farmer after hogs got in a corn patch. Damage was set at \$5,000. Dogs and shooting were used to remove seven hogs. No new losses have occurred and monitoring continues at this time. These pigs were suspected to have been released, as all were adults and the boars were castrated. ODAFF Investigative Services agents are looking into the incident.

Beaver Damage Management

WS received a request from a Comanche County cooperater after beaver cut several trees valued at \$1,000. The Specialist verified the damage and is utilizing snares to alleviate the problem. Three beaver have been captured to date and work continues.

A Harper County rancher contacted WS after beaver stopped up a tin horn causing \$750 road damage. Conibear traps were utilized to remove three beaver. Work continues. No new losses have been reported.

WS was contacted by a Logan County cooperater after beaver dammed up a tin horn causing \$500 in road damage. The Specialist verified the problem and utilized spotlighting and shooting to remove two beaver. Work continues at this time.

A Sequoyah County farmer contacted WS, reporting that beaver had dammed up a drainage ditch on his property, causing damage. Conibear traps and shooting were used to remove five beavers from the ditch, and work is ongoing.

A WS Specialist was contacted by a Craig County landowner with beaver damage concerns. The landowner reported that beaver were flooding a main county roadway. The WS Specialist captured five problem beaver to date, utilizing conibear traps. Work is continuing at this time. Damage to the county roadway was valued at \$3,000. The landowner was informed on several environmental changes and structural repairs that can be made to prevent future damages.

WS was contacted by a Lincoln County landowner about beavers flooding a farm road on his property. A WS Specialist responded to the call, and determined that the flooding was indeed caused by beavers. To date, two beavers and four dams have been removed from the property. Work is ongoing at this time.

WS received a phone call from a Tulsa County landowner with a complaint that beavers had dammed up a creek making it impossible to reach his property. WS investigated the problem area and found abundant beaver sign. The Specialist broke the dam and utilized spotlighting/shooting to remove two problem beaver. Work continues at this time.

A Muskogee County homeowner contacted WS, and reported that beavers had cut down several trees along a drainage ditch on his property. The landowner had managed to remove one beaver from the ditch, but had no further success. A WS Troubleshooter verified that the beavers had caused an estimated \$750 in damages. Conibear traps were used to quickly remove one additional beaver from the ditch. No further damage has been observed or reported, and work is complete at this time.

WS was contacted by a Kay County Commissioner with beaver damage concerns. The commissioner reported that beaver were responsible for flooding a county roadway. The Specialist utilized spotlighting/shooting to remove five problem beaver. Work continues at this time.

WS was contacted by an Okfuskee County Commissioner with beaver damage concerns. The commissioner explained that beaver were damming up four different locations road washing out with the heavy rains in the area. The WS Troubleshooter responded to the request and verified that beaver were responsible for an estimated \$800 worth of damage to the road way. The specialist utilized spotlighting/shooting to remove five problem beaver. Work continues at this time.

Other Mammals

Raccoons

An Adair County dairy farmer contacted WS with complaints with raccoons. He said that the raccoons had got in this milk barn and had torn the pipe off of the feed lines, at an estimated damage of \$750. The farmer had tried to cage trap them but had no luck. The WS Specialist used spotlighting/shooting to remove 17 problem raccoons. Work continues at this time.

Armadillos

Also in Adair County, a woman contacted WS with an armadillo problem. The lady said armadillos were digging under her house and in her flowers. Due to her health situation, she was unable to take care of the problem. The WS Specialist visited with the lady and verified the problem. The specialist used spotlighting/shooting and cage traps to remove three problem raccoons. Job is completed.

WS Assistance at Airports and Air Force Bases

Will Rogers World Airport

During the period, DRC-1339 was placed out to reduce starling populations on the airfield to reduce strike risk and property damage from bird droppings. WS also monitored mowing operations on the airfield that were attracting cattle egrets. WS hazed and removed nine cattle egrets on the AOA.

WS is continuing to monitor and haze Canada goose populations adjacent to the airfield. WS removed four Canada geese, 17 jackrabbits and three coyotes from the AOA this month.

Vance Air Force Base

The WS Biologist at VAFB removed some American kestrels trapped in a hangar at Vance. This month he also attended, and briefed at, the Supervisor of Flying training meeting. This group orchestrate flying operations for the base.

Altus Air Force Base

Altus Air Force Base has a large breeding population of Mississippi Kites that utilize the area every year. This year there is a kite population of around 50 kites. Approximately 20-30 kites utilize the 120 acre golf course/jogging track as their nesting area. To help address the Mississippi Kite problems on AAFB, WS provides information by publishing news paper articles, base-wide e-mails, posters, and flyers to educate people on kite behavior and what to do when swooped.

As the weather heated up, so did the number of kite strikes on people who ventured to close to nesting areas. In the month of July, the Wing Safety office has received four kite complaints on two nesting sites.

Wildlife Disease Surveillance

During the period, the WS Wildlife Disease Biologist was deployed by USDA to assist with the depopulation of domestic turkeys and chicken affected by the HPAI outbreak in Iowa.

Agricultural Statistics Division

General: The **first week** of July had rain departures at least 26 percent above normal district averages across the state. The Northeast district averaged the lowest amount of precipitation at 0.23 of an inch, while the South Central district averaged the highest departure at 1.96 inches. For the third consecutive week, drought conditions remained non-existent across the state with only 1.72 percent of the state considered abnormally dry, compared to 94.5 percent last year. According to the Oklahoma Mesonet, increasing high temperatures across the state allowed streams, rivers, and reservoirs to slowly recede going into July. However, heavy rainfall contributed to overrun of local lakes in areas of Central Oklahoma Thursday, July 2nd. Temperatures ranged from 58 degrees at Camargo on Tuesday, June 30th to 104 degrees at Buffalo on Wednesday, July 1st. Statewide temperatures averaged in the high 70s. Topsoil and subsoil moisture conditions were rated mostly adequate to surplus.

The **second week** in July saw precipitation levels average more than an inch across the state, ranging from 1.02 inches in the Southeast district to 4.95 inches in the East Central district. Drought conditions remained unchanged from the previous month, with only 1.72 percent of the state considered abnormally dry, compared to 94.5 percent last year. Temperatures ranged from 52 degrees at Beaver on Wednesday, July 8th to 104 degrees at Buffalo on Sunday, July 12th. Statewide temperatures averaged in the mid-to-high 70s. Topsoil and subsoil moisture conditions were rated mostly adequate to surplus. Row crop conditions ranged mostly good to excellent as wheat and canola harvest was winding down.

During the **third week** of July, minimal rainfall was seen across the state, with the Panhandle and North Central districts averaging the highest amounts of precipitation at 0.22 and 0.18 of an inch, respectively. Other districts did not record any rainfall. As of July 14th, no areas of the state were experiencing drought. Temperatures ranged from 60 degrees at Kenton on Friday, July 17th to 108 degrees at Buffalo on Monday, July 13th. The city of Buffalo recorded the highest temperature experienced in the state since 2013. In areas of the North Central district, heat indices reached up to 115 degrees. Statewide temperatures averaged in the mid-80s. Topsoil and subsoil moisture conditions were rated mostly adequate to surplus. Row crop conditions continued to remain mostly good to excellent. Pasture and Range conditions began to slide more between good to fair.

The **fourth week** of July recorded much of the state's rainfall accumulation in the Panhandle and East Central Oklahoma which averaged 2.02 and 3.12 inches respectively. Other areas of the state received minimal rainfall totaling less than 2 inches. According to the Oklahoma Mesonet, this month ranks as the 9th wettest since 1895, and the second since 1921. No areas of the state were experiencing drought. Temperatures ranged from 61 degrees at Kenton on Wednesday, July 22nd to 104 degrees at Hooker on Sunday, July 26th. Statewide temperatures averaged in the low-80s. Topsoil and subsoil moisture conditions were rated mostly adequate to surplus. Row crop conditions started to slide more between the good to fair condition ratings.

Statistics: The July *Crop Production* Report released on July 10, 2015 revised the Oklahoma wheat crop to 96.2 million bushels coming from 3.7 million acres harvested, and a yield of 26 bushels per acre.


Report to the State Board of Agriculture (June and July 2015)

AGRITOURISM

Staff attended the Green Country Marketing Association Annual Meeting in Bartlesville. Bartlesville Convention and Visitor's Bureau brought in Michael Wallis, best-selling author and award-winning reporter, Michael is a historian and biographer of the American West. He was also the voice of "Sheriff" in the Pixar movies *Cars* and *Cars 2*.

Staff met with Jamey Allen to discuss the Viticulture and Enology Revolving Fund, which is now part of Market Development and how this process will flow. We will house this grant in the Agritourism Program with the assistance of Jason Harvey and our current grant process. We will conduct the first round of this grant starting this September.

Staff attended the North American Agricultural Marketing Officers (NAAMO) Conference in Salem, MA with director Jamey Allen. The Oklahoma Wine Trail marketing Project was selected to present as a finalist for the Excellence in Marketing Award. We did not win the award but it was an honor to be selected as a finalist and to have the opportunity to visit with directors from all over North America and gain new ideas and best practices. We visited some very large scale Agritourism farms some that were family farms and some that had started with nothing and built from scratch.

Staff completed an Oklahoma Agritourism Association Accreditation inspection at Moore Farms. They will now apply for ODOT signage. Staff conducted visits to prepare videos for our Customer Service/Humor in Business Rolling Workshop that will be held on August 25th. Staff visited Redlands community College to see the research gardens and vineyard and assist the new director in forming an advisory committee for the viticulture and enology program. Staff participated in a travel road show at Boeing; good turn out and gave out a lot of material and talked to several employees, some new to the Oklahoma area due to the job location change.

Staff participated in the OK Bride Summer bridal show at the Cox Convention Center, great turn out and highlighted the Country Stay brochures, the Wine Trail Maps and the Wedding category. AG IN THE CLASSROOM

AITC contacts attended Unbridled Possibilities National Ag in the Classroom Conference in Louisville, Kentucky. 16 Oklahoma attendees including Oklahoma Farm Bureau Leadership Team, Oklahoma AITC Teacher of the Year, Oklahoma CHS Scholarship winner, and staff heard from children's author, Peggy Thomas. All in attendance received Thomas' new book, yet to be released,

“Thomas Jefferson Grows a Nation.” Staff attended workshops and gathered new ideas to implement.



54 teachers went On the Road with Ag in the Classroom to Gore, Webbers Falls, Poteau, and Pocola. Teachers visited Dismuke’s Cattle Ranch, Cal2Homa agritourism stop, an alpaca farm, Sloan Farms and Pioneer Seed dealer, Consolidated Grain and Barge, Agritech Aerial sprayers, you-pick blueberry farm, Sebo cattle ranch and sod farm, Kerr research station, Wild Things Farm, Sprio Mounds, Cavanal Hill, and Holdenville Sale Barn. All along the way teachers were introduced to AITC lessons and resources.



250+ teachers attended AITC state summer conference, “Farmland- Farming Ground, Farming Minds.” 24 workshops were presented by outstanding AITC teachers, panel and roundtable discussions were facilitated by AITC agricultural partners, and lunch was sponsored by the Oklahoma Beef Council. The movie, “Farmland” was shown to participants and movie snacks were provided by Oklahoma Farm Credits. A new AITC resource, Specialty Cropopoly was debuted. The project was funded through a Specialty Crop Block grant.



Staff presented Ag in the Classroom workshops to:
15 students participating in the OSU Ag Ed Academy
12 teachers at the STEM conference on campus at OSU
19 elementary education students at SWOSU
55 Oklahoma City public school librarians

Coordinators participated in Oklahoma State Department of Education's state conference EngageOK. An exhibit booth provided a place for teachers to gather AITC information and have some popcorn. Staff presented 3 workshops for 90 educators. Coordinators partnered with 3 FFA Chapters to provide greeters for the conference. The students participating got kudos from Superintendent Hofmeister and SDE.

Staff judged American National Angus Association scrapbook, poster, and marketing contests. Staff judged State 4-H Individual and PowerPoint Speech Contests.

AITC Staff continued to update resources, including adding the Aurasma feature to upper level Specialty Crop Activity magazine. Resources were provided to the Comanche County Conservation District. Website activity for a portion of the reporting period included 11,566 Pageviews and 8,496 Unique Visits. AITC Facebook for the reporting period included 2,766 friends.

MADE IN OKLAHOMA

Made in Oklahoma staff has been working on membership renewals for all 400+ Made in Oklahoma Program members. This includes updating product information, physical addresses, emails and retailers that carry their products. This helps to insure that the information found on the Made in Oklahoma Program website is clear and up to date. When requesting this information, staff also included a survey which asked various questions about how we can better serve its members. They were asked if ODAFF were to coordinate a Made in Oklahoma Learning Conference in the near future, what type of topics would they be most interested in seeing presented. A few of those topics included, marketing, product testing, how to find distributors, labeling, import/export, online marketing, social media and how to expand their businesses. The majority of those that responded would prefer to see a conference held in the spring or summer. The companies were also asked about their interest in regional/international sales. They all expressed interest in learning more about

exporting and what it involves.

Market Development staff has been working with the OK History Center on an exhibit featuring many Made in Oklahoma companies that is scheduled to open November 2015. They have conducted interviews with Shawnee Milling Company and Round House Overalls both from Shawnee and both 100+ year old companies. They are also gathering historic artifacts from various Oklahoma companies that will be featured in the exhibit.

A staff member attended the Food and Agricultural Products Center Basic Training Workshop on June 18th in Stillwater. This one-day training workshop is available to individuals interested in starting their own business. A representative from the Made in Oklahoma program presents a short presentation to the group so that they are aware of what the program has to offer once they get their business off the ground. There were 11 prospective companies participating.

Market Development staff met with Steve Banker of McAlester Oklahoma to answer questions about starting up a food business. Mr. Banker and his family are interested in manufacturing a BBQ sauce that would be unique to Oklahoma. It was recommended that they attend the next available Food and Agricultural Products Center Basic Training Workshop to receive information about trademarking, labeling, marketing and requirements of a certified kitchen vs. a co-packer.



MADE IN OKLAHOMA COALITION

Staff joined David Brooks at Channel 9 on the Fourth of July to help with an early morning TV spot. Staff planned for the upcoming MIO budget year and for the MIO Board of Directors retreat held in Tulsa on June 23-24. Activities for next fiscal year were discussed as were changes and updates to the MIO By-Laws. Suan Grant, Suan's Foods, attended the retreat on the 23rd to make a presentation about the formation of a committee to assist with new members. The committee will be called the Emerging Committee, and staff will be the lead coordinator for this effort. Staff met with Suan on July 14 to develop agendas for upcoming monthly meetings, the first of which will be held on August 12. David Brooks and Tish Fidler-Tate have agreed to serve as mentors for the committee.

The July MIO meeting was held on the 10th. Staff prepared the agenda for the Retail meeting that preceded the general meeting. Upcoming retail activity includes a promotion at Firelake in Shawnee,

the annual Shelby Report Advertisement, the AWG Show on September 10, and the OGA Show scheduled for September 16. Staff will be the lead coordinator on these events. At the July meeting, Brian Jackson, Woody Candy, reported he traveled to Iowa following his participation in the FMI Show to have additional meetings with HiVee management. Lee Merrifield, Daddy Hinkle's, also reported they were able to accommodate a large shipment to HiVee for the 4th of July holiday. This was also a direct result of their participation in the FMI Show.

Staff attended a luncheon at Cattleman's in OKC on July 8th. The winners of a Homeland in-store display contest traveled to OKC where they were treated to lunch and tours of local food processors, Ozarka, Chef's Requested Foods and Clements Foods. A conference call was scheduled for July 10 to discuss the proposed changes and adaptations made to the MIO By-Laws. On July 17, staff attended a meeting at the OKC Food Bank to discuss a website promotion that is being developed to promote the Food 4 Kids Backpack program. The Food Bank has a virtual store on their website. The concept will be to include MIO products on the 'retail store shelves' of this website store the month of October; all the proceeds will go to the Food Bank. No products will change hands; it is an on-line store, the proceeds from consumer shopping in the 'make believe' store will be a donation to the Food Bank. MIO companies who want to participate will pay \$50 per SKU. Channel 9 will promote, and the event falls within Governor's Fallin's October campaign to raise funds for the Food Bank.

Staff met with Lisa Garza, Lamar, on July 21st to discuss a strategy for the Fall Billboard campaign. Also on July 21st, staff attended a presentation made by five new MIO candidate members. All five candidates were approved by the attending Board of Directors. New members are Bedre Chocolate, Billy Goat Ice Cream, Scissortail Farms, Mitchell's Sausage Rolls and Della Terra Pasta. For the 2015-16 fiscal year MIO has 56 company members, which includes 12 new members, and 11 associate members for a total membership of 67. Staff spent considerable time building a membership spreadsheet and communicating with the MIO Bookkeeper on membership billing. In addition, MIO companies with past due invoices were individually contacted, and time was spent coordinating the annual appropriation contract with the agency for the new fiscal year.

Staff partnered with US Foods to host a Made in Oklahoma themed Food Expo at the Reed Center in Midwest City on June 17th, 2015. The Made in Oklahoma Coalition was featured as attendees

Staff coordinated a tour of three MIO manufacturing plants in the Oklahoma City area for Homeland employees. The tour was a prize for a display contest using MIO products. Homeland stores competed against each other by building displays featuring MIO products. The four stores that won were from Okemah, Muskogee, Lawton, and Clinton. The day started with a trip to the Ozarka Water plant. From Ozarka the winners were taken to Chef's Requested located in historic OKC Stockyards City. Lunch was provided to the group at Cattleman's. The day wrapped up with a tour of Clement's foods. The day was a great success!

Market Development staff coordinated the annual two day MIO executive board retreat. During the two days staff led the board in adopting a new budget, creating a FY'16 marketing plan and tweaking the bylaws.

Staff coordinated two days of new member interviews. A total of 12 companies were interviewed and all 12 were accepted. The new members include: Billygoat Ice Cream, Bedre Chocolate, Scissortail Farms, Mitchell's Sausage Rolls, Della Terra Pasta, Kize Concepts, Greer Ranch House Sausage, Cheatwood's Honey, Ace in the Bowl, Coop Ale Works, Southern Okie, and Fizz O'Water.

DIVERSIFIED MARKETING

FARM TO SCHOOL

F2S staff attended a statewide cafeteria cooks training called Cooking for Kids.

<http://www.cookingforkids.ok.gov/> Federal regulations regarding school lunch and breakfast programs are ever changing. In recent years, the guidelines for sodium, fat, number and variety of fruits and vegetables offered and other components of school meals have rapidly changed and school cafeteria workers are struggling to keep up. This is due to lack of knowledge and training within the school for workers to cook with fresh food and a lack of equipment and funding to provide proper kitchen equipment to cook food that meets all of the new requirements. Cooking for Kids is a culinary training program based out of OSU that targets school cafeteria workers and allows them to improve their knife and seasoning skills and learn how to cook with more fresh foods. It is a 4 day, 2-tiered training program that incorporates nutrition lessons, taste testing experiments and information about cultural ingredients and how to engage students to make healthier choices. The training makes the school cafeteria workers feel more professional in their role and empowers them to take cooking for the kids in their schools more seriously and to grasp the impact that eating school meals has on the health of the children in Oklahoma.





Staff worked with school districts statewide, distributors (such as Ben E. Keith, GoFresh, Buddy's, Freshpoint, Vinyard, Jim's Produce and US Foods) and Perennial Produce on getting the watermelon distribution orders received, organized into Excel matrices and sent to the respective sites. Unfortunately, F2S distribution orders have been on the decline in recent years (orders used to average 11-12,000 cases per school year; the last 5 years have been below 8,000 and now down to 6,000) and Perennial Produce is unable to keep the delivery price at \$11.00/case as it has been in years past. The Department of Agriculture no longer supplements the delivery charges as in years past. Producers are not willing to deliver to multiple distribution centers on a weekly basis without raising prices too high for schools to afford it. Staff will inform schools that F2S watermelon will not be available for purchase this school year and will work to improve this process and to seek a solution that will benefit grower, distributor and schools.

Staff is working with contacts statewide to build a network for a F2S advisory council. Those represented will include: school districts (both large and small, both urban and rural, both schools with and without contracted foodservice), distributors, growers (large and small, GAP and non-GAP certified), other agencies (such as the Department of Education and the Department of Health) and others who have a vested interest in F2S.

Staff met with Larry Heyman, co-founder of OKC Harvest, at North Highland Elementary School in OKC. <http://www.okcharvest.org/> OKC Harvest is a program with OKC Beautiful and works to implement small, manageable school gardens at interested schools. They partner with others (such as Whole Foods and 4H groups) and have about 18 gardens in the OKC area as of now. F2S can work with OKC Harvest in getting good information to schools about how to start a garden without becoming overwhelmed with too much work or not enough information on how to tie it into classroom learning. OKC Harvest looks at school gardens as outdoor classrooms and can provide curriculum to go along with the growing involved.

Staff met with the School Wellness Systems Coordinator for the Center for the Advancement of Wellness with the Oklahoma State Department of Health to discuss future collaborations and discuss programs with the other. They work to get schools "certified healthy", which then makes the school eligible to apply for grant funding through the Tobacco Settlement Endowment Trust (TSET). F2S participation is one of the criteria that schools must meet in order to reach the highest tier of Certified Healthy.

Staff briefly spoke with visitors from Langston University during their visit to ODAFF. Discussed the F2S program in general and how staff has helped develop and upkeep the garden.



Okla. Stat. 2 § 3-86(A)(2) provides:

A. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. Any license, certificate, or identification issued may be suspended, canceled, revoked, or refused issue or reissue by the Board after a notice and an opportunity to be heard has been given to the holder of the license or certificate. The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made if the Board finds:

2. A person has negligently used methods or pesticides that are ineffective or improper for the purpose for which they have been employed;

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

17. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.

- Respondent is engaged in the business of applying pesticides.
- Respondent, as a pesticide applicator, was required to perform the trimming and spraying of pesticides in a reasonable manner.



- On or around July 30, 2014, Bogle Right of Way company applied herbicide along a power line with a right of way of 30 feet across 42417 Little River Road Tecumseh, OK 74873.
- The right of way has been cleared fifteen to twenty feet on either side of the line, and a visual inspection of the trees approximately twenty-five feet from the center the utility line were affected by pesticides.
- Sample results recovered Triclopyr outside the utility line easement.
- Respondent negligently or improperly applied pesticides outside the easement.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

18. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, Respondent has violated Okla. Stat. 2 § 3-86(A)(2) by negligently or improperly using methods not suitable or safe for the purpose for which they have been employed.

- Respondent purportedly performed a termite pesticide treatment on May 20, 2014, to the property of Mr. Terry Harryman, 18301 Willow Oak Ln, Edmond, OK.
- A complaint was received in our office on June 27, 2014 (File No. PMC-14-136) and a Field Program Inspector was assigned.

- On June 27, 2014, an ODAFF Field Inspector performed an inspection of the property. The inspection revealed the job failed to meet state minimum standards because the adjacent concrete slabs were not drilled and treated, there was no exterior treatment or trenching performed, and post construction soil residue levels were below the tolerance of 10 ppm.
- Complainant's property at the time of purported treatment was being prepared for a real estate transaction.
- Respondent failed to issue and post an ODAFF-1 report on the termite inspection as required for a property transaction or when there is a contested matter on a wood infestation report on a particular property.
- Respondent did issue an ODAFF-2 as required.
- Respondent failed to issue a proper written contract for the commercial application of pesticides which states the minimum standards for termite work performed and an explanation as to why any deviations from minimum requirements were performed.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

2. Respondent is hereby notified that a Prehearing Conference¹ will be held before an impartial Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) at 1:30 p.m. on September 17, 2015 in the Board Room on the first floor of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry building, located at 2800 North Lincoln Blvd, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

3. **Please note the Prehearing Conference is not an evidentiary hearing: witnesses and evidence will not be presented at the Prehearing Conference.**

¹ Prehearing Conferences may address any of the following: a.) Identification and simplification of issues, including the elimination of frivolous claims or defenses; b.) O. Box 130547, Tyler, TX 75713.

16. Pursuant to Okla. Stat. Ann. 2 § 2-4(A)(3), ODAFF has authority to regulate persons who violate the Oklahoma Agricultural Code by initiating and prosecuting administrative, civil, or criminal actions and proceedings necessary under the Oklahoma Agricultural Code.

2 O.S. § 3-86 (A)(4) provides:

It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. Any license, certificate, or identification issued may be suspended, canceled, revoked, or refused issue or reissue by the Board after a notice and an opportunity to be heard has been given to the holder of the license or certificate. The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made if the Board finds:

(4) A person has used a pesticide in a manner inconsistent with its labeling unless prior written approval has been obtained from the Board;

OAC 35:30-17-25 provides:

(b) A certified applicator shall be on site to supervise any pesticide application by a non-service technician.

(c) A service technician shall be on site to make the actual application of any pesticide unless a certified applicator is present at the job site.

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

17. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.

- Respondent is a certified pesticide applicator engaged in the business of applying pesticides.
- On May 14, 2015, ODAFF investigator Williams Damardray observed, through a routine inspection, Respondent's employees applying pesticides to the property of AEP/PSO power sub-station.
- The ODAFF investigator observed the applicators making the application without wearing the proper protective equipment. (PMR-15-145).
- A request by the ODAFF investigator for certifications was made and the applicators were unable to provide a copy.
- Employee Christobal Tabera's applicator's license had not been renewed and was expired. The other employee was not licensed.
- Products being applied included Dupont Oust 352-601, Dupont Perspective 352-846, Primera One Prodiamine 60063-26, and RoundUp Pro 524-529.
- The two applicators were wearing leather mechanics gloves and not the waterproof/chemical resistant gloves as required by the labels of the Dupont Perspective and Primera One Prodiamine.
- The ODAFF investigator issued a Stop Sale Order for making application without the proper certification and for not wearing the proper protective equipment.



ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

18. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, Respondent has violated 2 O.S. § 3-86 (A)(4) by failing to use proper protective equipment when applying pesticides. Respondent also violated OAC 35:30-17-25 by allowing its employees to work as certified technicians or as certified applicators without proper certification.







The Inspector found price verification errors on certain of the products so inspected, with a total number of four (04) overcharges found in the aggregate during the aforementioned inspection(s).

16. The allegations of fact summarized above describe a violation of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code, or rules promulgated thereunder, as follows:

2 O.S. Supp. 2010 § 14-38(J) – The failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of a given inspection shall be deemed a failed inspection.

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

17. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent. More particularly, during the inspection described in Paragraph 15 above, Inspectors from the Department

performed a price verification inspection at the Store. Such inspection determined that the Store had certain consumer item price overcharges in the number set forth in Paragraph 15 above. These overcharges result in Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of this inspection and the subject inspection is viewed under 2 O.S. 2001 § 14-38(J) as a failed inspection.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

18. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, Respondent violated 2 O.S. 2001 § 14-38(J) because Respondent, by virtue of the aforementioned consumer item price overcharges, failed to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of the aforementioned inspection, resulting in a failed inspection. (Total Count 04, Violation 3rd).







1. Complainant, the Office of General Counsel (“OGC”) of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry (ODAFF) advises Respondent of the following alleged violations of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code and/or rules.

PREHEARING CONFERENCE NOTICE

2. Respondent is hereby notified that a Prehearing Conference¹ will be held before an impartial Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) at **1:30 p.m. on June 18, 2015** in the Board Room on the first floor of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry building, located at 2800 North Lincoln Blvd, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

3. **Please note the Prehearing Conference is not an evidentiary hearing: witnesses and evidence will not be presented at the Prehearing Conference.**

¹ Prehearing Conferences may address any of the following: a.) Identification and simplification of issues, including the elimination of frivolous claims or defenses; b.) 15. Pursuant to Okla. Stat. Ann. 2 § 2-4(A)(3), ODAFF has authority to regulate persons who violate the Oklahoma Agricultural Code by initiating and prosecuting administrative, civil, or criminal actions and proceedings necessary under the Oklahoma Agricultural Code.

16. The allegations of fact summarized in paragraph 17 below describe a violation of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code, or rules promulgated thereunder, as follows:

2 O.S. Supp. 2010 § 14-38(J) - The failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of a given inspection shall be deemed a failed inspection.²

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

17. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent:

(a.) On the date(s) set forth on the attached Exhibit A, an Inspector of the Department performed one or more price verification inspection(s) at the Store. The Inspector found price verification errors on certain of the products so inspected, with a total number of five (5) overcharges found in the aggregate during the aforementioned inspection(s).

² This matter is subject to penalty enhancement under the statutory scheme set forth in 2 O.S. § 14-38(J)(1-6) for failure to "pass" inspection(s) during a period of increased inspection frequency. The present matter is viewed as a fourth violation under Section 14-38(J). (Please see Notices of Violation 14-575-OGC and 14-732-OGC) "Fourth violations discovered within any twelve-month period will be assessed a two-hundred-fifty-dollar penalty per consumer item which results in an overcharge or potential overcharge." 2 O.S. 2011 § 14-38(J)(4).







16. Pursuant to Okla. Stat. Ann. 2 § 2-4(A)(3), ODAFF has authority to regulate persons who violate the Oklahoma Agricultural Code by initiating and prosecuting administrative, civil, or criminal actions and proceedings necessary under the Oklahoma Agricultural Code.

OAC § 35:30-17-24(d) provides:

(d) Every applicator of pesticides shall employ an appropriate method to prevent the backflow of spray materials during filling, mixing, and/or application operations. The method shall include, but not be limited to, the employment of a check valve or similar in-line device, or positive mechanical method, such as an air gap, designed to insure that backflow shall not occur.

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

17. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.

- Respondent is an operator of a business engaged in the application of pesticides.
- On March 18, 2014, a complaint was made (PMC-14-088) to the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture (ODAFF) to investigate a possible [chemical] spill located at the intersection of Country Club and Elm in El Reno, OK.



- ODAFF investigator, Tivis Amity, observed a large amount of dry dye and liquid originating from the parking lot of Long's Lawn & Garden store.”
- The investigator spoke with Ms. Long (wife of Respondent) who stated her husband, Mr. Long (Respondent), owner of Long's Supply (C#6126) has a commercial pesticide license (CA#24098).
- Respondent indicated that he was filling his tank when it spilled over.
- He also stated that he attempted to clean the area with water which caused the spill to spread into the intersection.”
- Respondent was asked if he tried to create a barrier to stop it from running and he stated he “did not think to do that.”
- Respondent said the tank mix was 2 quarts of each of the following: “Pendulum 3.3 EC (EPA# 241-341), Trimec 992 (EPA#2217-656), and Honcho Plus (EPA# 524-454) into 200 gallons of water.”
- Respondent stated his method of filling the tank is to “put[] the water hose down in the tank when filling it [because] it fills the tank faster and mixes the chemicals as it fills.” He then “pulls the hose out and allows it to run for a couple of minutes before turning the water off.”
- Respondent was informed that the law requires the use of an air gap or a back flow device when filling the spray tank.
- Samples returned positive for pesticide residue.



ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

18. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, Respondent has violated **OAC 35:30-17-24(d)** by failing to employ an appropriate method to prevent the backflow of spray materials during filling, mixing, and/or application operations.

ATTORNEY CONFERENCES

14. Respondent has substantial business operations and assets within the State of Oklahoma. Based upon current information and belief, at all relevant times hereto, Respondent was the owner/operator of an unlicensed domestic meat processing facility (the "Facility") located in Bixby, OK. During a site inspection in May 2014, Respondent was operating the Facility for the purpose of slaughtering and processing domestic animals for others for a fee. The Department's inspector observed two (02) domestic animals (one beef and one hog) having been so processed. Said two (2) domestic animals so processed and sold by Respondent were capable of use as human food and were either (a) required to be inspected and passed pursuant to 2 O.S. 2011 § 6-190 (d) or (b) required to be prepared in a facility that meets the requirements of the custom processing exemption of OAC 35:37-3-5. Respondent's processing and slaughtering Facility is not an inspected facility under 2 O.S. 2011 § 6-190 (d) nor is it exempt. In addition, Respondent at no time held any special permission, license, or permit of any kind from the Department to engage in such activities. Moreover, the subject domestic livestock being slaughtered were at no time subjected to either ante-mortem and/or post-mortem inspection(s) by the Department.

15. The Respondent is required by law to obtain a custom exempt permit for the Facility as follows:

OAC 35:37-3-5. Registration and application requirements for custom exempt plants.

(a) Every establishment where livestock are custom slaughtered without ante-mortem and post-mortem inspection or in which custom processing of carcasses or parts of carcasses derived from livestock slaughtered without ante-mortem and post-mortem inspection is required to submit an application and have all facilities approved by the Director prior to conducting operations.

(b) Any person or establishment, not licensed as a retail exempt business, engaged in custom processing of inspected and passed carcasses for individuals, is required to submit an application and meet all facility requirements prior to conducting operations.

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

16. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent. More particularly, Respondent at no time held any license, permit, or exemption of any kind allowing Respondent to engage in the activity of slaughtering and processing domestic animals.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

17. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, Respondent violated OAC 35:37-3-5 because Respondent, without any permission, license, or exemption of any kind, engaged in the activity of slaughtering and processing domestic animals for retail sale. (Total Count 02, Violation 1st).

20. Arrangements to discuss the matter before the Prehearing Conference are encouraged.

ENFORCEMENT PROCEEDINGS

21. Enforcement proceedings may include but are not limited to:

- a.) Administrative fines or penalties;
- b.) Revocation, suspension, or denial for up to one (1) year of any license, permit, or charter issued by ODAFF or the Board;
- c.) Criminal actions, which could involve fines, imprisonment, or both; and
- d.) Civil actions.

22. Pursuant to 2 Okla. Stat. § 2-18(A), after notice and opportunity for a hearing in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act, if the State Board of Agriculture finds any person in violation of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code or any rule promulgated or order issued pursuant thereto, unless otherwise specifically provided by statute or rule, the Board shall have the authority to assess an administrative penalty of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and not more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for each violation.

23. Each animal, each action, or each day a violation continues may constitute a separate and distinct violation.

24. Fine matrixes containing typical fines for most violations of statutes and rules enforced by ODAFF may be found in the OAC at Title 35.

OKLAHOMA SMALL BUSINESS REGULATORY FLEXIBILITY ACT

25. The Oklahoma Small Business Regulatory Flexibility Act, 75 O.S. Supp. 2002, § 506, may apply to this action; please review the full act to determine if it applies to you.

ENFORCEMENT OF JUDGMENTS

26. Administrative penalties, civil penalties, and other fines imposed by the Board shall be enforced pursuant to the procedure outlined in 2 O.S. § 2-7(B) and the Uniform Enforcement of Foreign Judgments Act, 12 O.S. § 719 *et seq.*

INFORMAL DISPOSITION OF AN INDIVIDUAL PROCEEDING

27. Informal disposition of an Individual Proceeding may be made by Stipulation, Agreed Settlement, Consent Order, or Default.

28. Stipulation, Agreed Settlement, Consent Order, or Default shall be approved by the State Board of Agriculture.

29. Proposed Final Administrative Orders shall be prepared and issued in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act and presented to the Board of Agriculture for review and approval.


STIPULATION
